## THE NOVEMBER 2022 MEETING

The November meeting was a hybrid meeting with the guest speaker being Professor Mike Kirby who delivered an excellent talk on many aspects of prostate cancer and illustrated with a comprehensive set of slides. He has been involved in prostate cancer treatment for more than 30 years, was a GP and is now a professor and involved in the research network. On slide 2 you can see his credentials.

I have listed below the main points of the talk and some additional information that Mike gave during his talk.

Over the years the discovery of PSA has been a breakthrough and detection techniques have greatly improved. Biopsies can now be targeted at areas of suspicion and the number of biopsy samples can be as high as 40.

Mike showed a slide of the leading causes of premature death and disability in England death, and another slide showing that prostate cancer diagnoses now exceeds those of the breast, lung and bowel.

He said that a priority is to catch prostate cancer cases earlier. He then discussed the PROMIS trial and showed slides of MRI scans and described the advances that transperineal biopsies have made compared to the previous transrectal biopsies.

There was then a discussion on the comparative outcomes of surgery against radiotherapy followed by a description of the radiotherapy technique and its recent improvements. The cardiovascular risk and its prevention was mentioned and then much information on hormone therapy.

The important roles of exercise and diet were discussed – exercise is of particular importance and Mike showed several slides concerning exercise and stressed that it is one of the most important ways of mitigating the cardiovascular and metabolic risks of hormone therapy.

By way of thanking Mike for his talk, the RPCSG has made a donation to a charity of Mike's choice, Prostate Cancer UK.
