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## **THE MAY MEETING**

Chairman Chris Addison introduced the evening, welcoming all to the meeting and a particular welcome to four new members. I am grateful to Chris for providing the following report on the talk at the May meeting:

Our speaker for the evening was Susan Drew, Peer Support Officer, of the charity Prostate Cancer UK (PCUK). Susan opened her talk by giving a short resumé of how she became involved with PCUK and what a joy and privilege it is to be working for them. She had been at PCUK for a few months and had only given a few presentations, but she soon had the audience warming to her: as she said, a faux pas occasionally slipped out, like ‘in a nut shell’.

The mission of PCUK is supporting medical research and that is where donations to the charity are mainly directed. She particularly liked feedback on the work of PCUK and this was demonstrated on her trip to us on the train to Reading, when talking to a fellow passenger who had volunteered the fact that he had known about prostate matters through a campaign PCUK had run at mainstream football matches throughout the country.

PCUK over the next few weeks would now be concentrating on helping with a 30-second TV advert on prostate matters leading up to Father’s Day on June 16<sup>th</sup>. TV adverts are generally expensive, but this work was being funded by a generous donor, pro bono, ensuring its affordability.

Susan emphasised the importance of using the PCUK Helpline, not just for information on the prostate, but the charity was there for emotional support, if callers needed that as well. She pointed out that the Peer Support team has taken over the management of the One to One peer support service, and Susan is currently doing the matching of volunteers to men who request the service and are referred by their Specialist Nurses.

To screen or not to screen was still a hot topic nationally and men need to go, and be encouraged to go, to their doctor for a PSA blood test. Although this test is regarded as reliable, interpreting the results takes careful judgment and assessment and this message needs to be reinforced. PCUK are looking at a screening process that they felt needed to be simple and more effective, so they are funding a project, through their Research Innovation Award, being run by Professor Paula Mendes of the University of Birmingham. This project is hoping to revolutionise the PSA blood test using nanoparticle science to make detection much more accurate.

Susan told us that breast screening programmes were 20 years ahead of prostate screening as she felt women had pushed for this more successfully. In her opinion, men therefore needed to be more vocal and proactive on medical matters of a prostate kind.

In terms of charity size compared to others, PCUK was relatively small in that its income was in the region of £25M, whereas Cancer Research UK was about £634M.

She reinforced the statistic that 1:8 white men are likely to contract prostate cancer, but the ratio amongst black men was as high as 1:4.

Susan's talk and presentation provoked many questions from members who were very appreciative of the information they had gleaned from the evening.

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### **NEXT GROUP MEETING 7th JUNE 2019**

The meeting on the 7th June will have Mark Foulkes as the guest speaker. He is a Consultant Nurse in the oncology unit at the Royal Berkshire Hospital and will give a talk about the work of the Oncology unit.

### **NEXT RPCSG WALK - 4th JUNE 2019**

After about 4 miles turn left to Hambleden and about one mile further on bear right at a fork in the road and the village centre is then about 150 yards further on. The sat-nav postcode RG9 6RP will take you close to the centre of the village. About 50 yards after the centre of the village the road turns to the left to Pheasant's Hill, but do not take this turn, instead continue straight on and then turn right into the car park behind the pub. The total walk will be about 5 miles.
